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## **Virtual Field Trip: La Crescenta Library with Library Manager Marta Wiggins**

[La Crescenta Library](#), founded in 1914 as the system's 78th branch and rebuilt and reopened at its present location in 2010, serves an unincorporated area in the foothills north of Glendale and west of La Canada. Located adjacent to the Angeles National Forest and Deukmejian Wilderness Area, you might want to follow a visit to La Crescenta Library with a hike and a meal in nearby Montrose.

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**What makes La Crescenta Library special?** Library Manager Marta Wiggins is quick to answer: "the people."

She explains, "The people who work here. The people who walk through the doors. The people who volunteer - teens and our Friends of the Library group."

Marta gestured to a pile of new books, *Spare* by Prince Harry. The Friends of the Library funded this purchase, as well as 10 copies of *Lessons in Chemistry* by Bonnie Garmus - two best sellers that Library goers are clamoring to check out.

[Remember: Don't see what you want in your library? If it's in one of the system's 85 community libraries, you can request to have it sent to your library to pick up.]

A trademark of the LA County Library system, La Crescenta Library reflects the needs and interests of the people who walk through its doors: a large children's area, a teen space and heavily used study room, books and DVDs in Korean, Armenian, Farsi, Spanish, Hindi, and English, computers, cozy chairs for reading one of the many periodicals or newspapers, and a community meeting room.

Many groups use the community room, including the Town Council, Sierra Club, and stamp and coin clubs. Marta points to display cases maintained by the local historical society and the Friends of Rosemont Preserve.

This library is integral to the community, Marta says, and many library-going families stretch back generations. People are at the heart of the library, she says - staff, as well as library users.

*La Crescenta Library staff say goodbye to the old library (1963-2007). Having once more outgrown the size and needs of its community (prior locations had included a local church building, store front, and school), the Library was rebuilt and reopened in 2010 in an arts and crafts style with approximately 15,000 square feet that includes a meeting space that is open to (and popular with) the public.*

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Marta explains, "Libraries are very special places - magical, really. They're about information and much more - they provide community, they create connection."

That connection takes many forms at La Crescenta Library: high school students meet up after school, a book club gathers monthly, an older housebound man calls each day - sometimes with a question, sometimes simply to say hello.

Marta says her staff - cross-trained and ready to jump in where needed - put their heart into their work, and appreciate getting to know the people who walk through their doors.

She shares the story of Malia, a young woman and former meth addict. She had gotten her GED and dreamed of going to college. But where to begin?

Staff guided her to study materials and virtual resources, including online courses to build computer skills and developing effective study habits. Over time, Malia achieved her goal.

She graduated college and, Marta proudly reports, is working on a PhD and drops by the library every few months to update staff.

These life-changing stories, Marta says, are part of every library. "Libraries are special. It's about the people."

*Los Angeles County Fire Museum is just one of the cool places your Library card will take you - for free - with the Discover & Go program.*

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- 1. Curated booklists that introduce you to people, places, cultures, and communities** - here's just a taste: [Dr. Martin Luther King Jr](#)'s legacy of non-violence, [Lunar New Year](#) (year of the rabbit, a fitting symbol of hope and resilience), and [Staff Picks](#) (books for all ages and in a range of genres)
- 2. Job Help** - Get [resources for job seekers here](#) or participate in [Work Ready](#) to develop skills and strategies for career success, and borrow a laptop and hotspot for the six-week course
- 3. Business Resource Center** - [resources](#) at the tip of your finger with a suite of databases, plus links to in-person help for entrepreneurs
- 4. Tax time** - Check for tax forms at your local library or check out the Library's [resource page for tax information](#)
- 5. Go places** (for free) - [Discover & Go](#) is back! Get free passes to museums, including the La Brea Tar Pits, Los Angeles County Fire Museum, Catalina Island Museum, Natural History Museum, and Academy Museum of Motion Pictures
- 6. Earn Your High School Diploma** - adults 19 years and over can earn a [free diploma, career certificate, and online career counseling](#)
- 7. Emerging Adults** - [programs & resources for adults 18 - 25](#) include virtual and in-person programs on topics of substance abuse awareness and support, and caring for clothes

8. **Citizenship & Immigration** - [lots of resources](#), from Citizenship in a Bag, to online resources for learning English, to booklists for Constitution and Citizenship Days, to sharing your immigration and citizenship stories

9. **Books by Mail** - individuals who are homebound, in a care facility, or in a rural area, can [order up to 4 books at a time](#) that the Library will mail

10. **Free printing** - Easy peasy...you can [send your print job](#) (up to 10 pages a day for free - black and white) to your local library, and pick it up
