Virtual Field Trip: Black Resource Center and beyond.

The Black Resource Center, located at A C Bilbrew Library (in an unincorporated area west of the city of Compton), is a treasure trove of stories and information, including about remarkable people who've shaped our community. A few are pictured above.

Left: actor Paul Robeson and publisher Charlotta Bass, first African American woman to own and operate a newspaper in the U.S., and in 1952, the first African American woman nominated to be Vice President.

Middle: Biddy Mason, born enslaved, was an early and prominent landowner in Los Angeles in the 1850s and 1860s, and founded the First African Methodist Episcopal Church in Los Angeles.

Right: A C Bilbrew, for whom A C Bilbrew Library is named, was the first Black person in the U.S. to have a radio show.

The Black Resource Center (BRC) may be physically closed, but you can still access many of its resources - through the Library catalog, and with virtual programs.



Communities of color have been hit especially hard during the pandemic. Record numbers of people are out of work, or looking for a new career opportunity to weather this economy and beyond.

The digital divide is real. Many people don't have access to a computer or reliable internet. And for job seekers, that's a gaping canyon.

To meet those needs - helping people develop career skills and find work, along with a free loan of a laptop and hotspot from one of 20 libraries - your Library launched [Work Ready](#).

The next 6-week online session of this job development program starts February 16.

And for moms, dads, and other caretakers, a heads-up: when life gives you distance learning, turn to *Parent-Ade* .

These virtual programs take place every Wednesday afternoon (in English and Spanish) to help you and your child navigate the challenges of school online.

There are also booklists for kids and teens, books by African American authors, and activity ideas for adults. Something for everyone, a way to jump start and develop learning and understanding about African American and Black histories and cultures that continues throughout the year.
